Our priorities include expanding access to mental health and substance use treatment, increasing funding for prevention education, and ensuring equitable access to recovery services. The Recovery Diversion Program, which began in Long Branch and has since expanded to other municipalities in Monmouth County, is a model of proactive, community-based intervention. Given its success in providing individuals with pathways to treatment and support, we believe this program should be expanded statewide. We will work to destigmatize addiction and treat it as the public health crisis it is, focused on compassion, not criminalization.
